Your library card

Staff members employed by the CTF or CTF houses are entitled to a Cambridge University staff card. This card also functions as your library card.

- Borrowing rights at all CTF libraries
- Up to 20 books at once
- Books auto-renew

CTF staff can also register with the Cambridge University Library (UL). Present your Cambridge ID card at the front desk on your first visit to register.

How to borrow

Borrow books at the self-service circulation computers using:

- Your surname
- Your library card barcode (e.g. VABC1)

- The book's barcode: a 5-digit code stuck in the front of every book (e.g. 8ABC1)

Digital resources

The CTF's principal e-resources are available via [Hedwig](#). Digital resources are searchable separately from iDiscover, which the CTF uses **only** for print resources.

Library services for teaching

Live Reading Lists

The library team creates and maintains Live Reading Lists for **every taught module**.

- Provides direct links to print and digital copies of all available texts: [see example](#)
- Helps students navigate the complex different search routes for CTF's library resources
- Based on reading lists and bibliographies submitted by teaching staff as part of **module guides** every Easter term
- New titles purchased, subject to approval by course oversight groups in Easter term
- Checked for broken links over the summer vacation for start of Michaelmas term
- Library team is happy to edit/add titles outside this schedule, please just get in touch.
- Due to the scale of modules, the library team are only able to verify links on Live Reading List pages. Maintaining links elsewhere on modules pages is tutors' responsibility.

Weekly readings and chapter extracts

Setting weekly readings (journal article or ebook chapter) for students? The library team can create verified, copyright-checked chapter uploads.

Why is this helpful?

- Most CTF ebooks are single-user licence only. This means only 1 person can read them at a time. If lots of students are trying to access an ebook at once for a weekly set reading, they can be turned away from the ebook. Licensed uploads allow unlimited users access at once.
- Due to the way access to e-journals is authenticated, it is usually not possible to create permalinks to journal articles. A licensed upload solves this problem.
- We can also upload scans of limited extracts of print-only books held in CTF libraries.

Please contact the library team with a list of your weekly set readings or chapters you would like uploading. We will add them to the Live Reading List.

Copyright

The library team ensures the CTF's **copyright** compliance by using the Copyright Licensing Agency's Digital Content Store for all uploads of copyright material (e.g. scans of book chapters, journal articles).

What can be uploaded?

- Only extracts from items owned by the CTF may be uploaded. You cannot use pages copied from your own books or those belonging to the Divinity Faculty, the University Library or Tyndale House.
- Must not exceed 10% of the complete text or a single chapter or article, whichever is the greater.
- Please note that our licence does not allow us to scan or otherwise disseminate extracts from newspapers.
