


January 2025 Update: Searching for journal articles and ebooks

EBSCO, the supplier of our online journals, and many of our ebooks, have made some updates to the way their search platform looks. All the functions remain the same, but there have been some cosmetic updates. This document will walk you through some of the main changes.

Searching

The basic search box remains the same. Type your search term into the search box:



The menu of filters you can apply to your search results has been simplified. To ensure you are seeing results you can access, make sure you select 'Full text' (1). You can also filter by Peer Reviewed articles (2), recency (3), or source type (4).

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Abstract
The present article is an interface between ecotheology and Practical Theology from an African indigenous knowledge systems (AIKS) perspective. The article pursues to facilitate a conservationist rapport between three complementary disciplines, namely: ecotheology, Practical Theology and AIKS. The study attempts to discuss the above disciplines in the context of the phrase "theological eco-praxis". Of particular note is the light that the above themes throw on the contemporary conservationist education. The study proposes a striking common ground through epistemological dialogue in order to set an agenda for a detailed and contextual debate on ecotheology in (South) Africa. Admittedly, previous conversations on ecotheology and AIKS are widely documented. However, the present essay is anchored on the following two main foci: (1) it examines the interface between ecotheology and Practical Theology and their functionality in the conservation of the natural habitat and (2) it explores the phenomena surrounding ecotheology in (South) Africa from AIKS perspective. In the pursuance of the above aim, it is anticipated that the readership in general and the church in particular will find the insights from the conversation to be beneficial to cause them to participate in the productive sustenance of the ecosystem. The study invites the church to be proactive towards protecting the environment. In this article, a social constructivist theory is employed. It is argued that African indigenous communities have always constructed their own methods toward wildlife conservation.

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Introduction

For the Love of the World: A Dialogue on Ecotheology

Our planet suffers greatly, and change from within our human communities needs to happen now. From growing problems of threatened biodiversity; to global pollution of water, air, and land; to extreme weather stimulated by rapid climate change, the problems we face as an interconnected living world are challenging, even daunting. We are in nothing less than a crisis. This ecological crisis calls for concerted and significant action by people everywhere, and particularly by people living in high-consuming contexts such as the United States. We need to engage now in practices that bring healing to the earth and limit the damage that modern life and civilization bring. Our planetary future depends upon it.

Like other types of liberative theology, ecotheology is first and foremost concerned with guiding and stimulating right action. We need to continue and deepen our personal, communal, and international action to bring justice and healing to a planet in peril. But action alone—without integrated thought, understanding, wisdom, or critical thinking—can lead us astray. We can make things worse if we are not careful and engage in thoughtless acts. Theological understanding has a vital role to play in this practical wisdom.

What is more, many people today still need to grasp the importance of our present environmental crisis. Inside and outside the church, persuasive work still needs to be done. Theological, philosophical, and scientific work should champion and bring into being liberation and reparation for Earth's living systems. As an interdisciplinary field within the environmental humanities, ecotheology speaks to relevance of beliefs, thoughts, and axioms as well as the critical role of praxis. This is why in ecotheological works natural science and social science frequently partner with variant forms of eco-criticism in the work of reinterpreting Scripture; revising and teaching new modes of worship, prayer, and


Read aloud

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
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


A pop-up window will appear. To generate a citation, select the 'Copy citation' tab. Select your reference style using the drop-down menu. Copy and paste the citation wherever you need it.



To export a reference, select the 'Export citation' tab. Select the option you want (RIS format is used for most reference management programmes, but there are other options available).




Navigate to your downloads folder, and open your file in your reference management programme of choice.




(Don't forget that some reference management systems like Zotero offer a browser plug-in that imports references with a single click, allowing you to skip these steps).

Browse all articles in a journal


To browse the whole run of a journal, this is a bit less simple than in the old system. On your search page, select 'Advanced search'.



From here, select the Publications tab below the search boxes.




This will open up a new search box for you to search for the journal name (1), or allow you to browse all journals in the AtlasPLUS database alphabetically (2).




Search by Bible book, chapter, or verse

Finally, the journal database AtlasPLUS has a really helpful feature called Scripture search, which lets you search all journal articles by Bible book, chapter, and verse. Unfortunately in the new interface this has been hidden away, and is much less convenient. EBSCO are working on this, and hope to have a more convenient solution within a few months. In the meantime, go to advanced search; select subjects (1). In the drop down menu next to the search box (2), select Atla Scripture search (3).
